
Earlier this week, I was in the new Year 5 classroom block at the time when students were lining up to go back into class after morning tea play. One student asked, "What are we doing next?" and he received the reply, "Big Write – we are doing writing." The boy who asked the question was thrilled, he jumped up and down saying, "Big Write, Big Write." His classmates joined him in his joyful chant. I was amazed to see genuine excitement on the faces of these Year 5 boys who were really looking forward to writing. I must admit I have never seen such a positive response for a writing lesson in all my years of teaching. What is the secret to this new excitement for writing at St John's?

This year we introduced a different focus on writing across the year levels with the aim of improving student writing achievement and providing students with memorable strategies to help them make their writing well-structured and more interesting. The teachers attended professional development sessions at the end of the 2015 school year when the children were all on holidays and we implemented the program at the commencement of this year.





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Big Write activities encourage quality writing rather than quantity. So instead of focussing on how much a student writes (because this could be poorly written and lacking in correct grammar and punctuation) the focus is on four key features that are required for good quality writing: Vocabulary, Connectives, Openers and Punctuation. When you visit our classrooms you will see displays on the walls as reminders of these four features - VCOP. Our new writing program is also a lot of fun. For example, students learn about punctuation by doing the 'Kung Fu Punctuation' dance and they are encouraged to talk about their stories before writing. Once they know exactly what their story will be about they can focus on using the four key features required for good writing. This focus on **how** to write, and not **what** to write can result in far better quality writing.



I encourage you to have conversations with your children about their writing as this will help them cement their ideas in their mind so that what to write becomes easier for them. Also ask them to show you how to do the 'Kung Fu Punctuation' dance, and join in their fun of learning.

Preparations are well underway for the College Carnival to be held on Saturday 21 May this year. This event is always a wonderful occasion of fun and community spirit and I am looking forward to seeing everyone there. Many of our Performing Arts groups will be providing entertainment on the day and the children in our primary music and dance groups are busily preparing their performance items.

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Kiss and Drive

Our Kiss and Drive pickup and drop off procedure has been developed in conjunction with Brisbane City Council and local police and it is an expectation that all families follow these procedures to ensure the safety of everyone. These procedures have been outlined to parents in previous newsletters and parent information handbooks, but if you are not familiar with them please contact Primary Reception for a copy.

Thank you to those parents who have been following our Kiss and Drive procedures correctly and not queuing around the round-about during peak pick-up times. This ensures that we are following road rules and also allowing local residents to use Alpine Place with greater ease. There is a very short period of time in the afternoons when the traffic in Alpine Place can become heavy and your cooperation in following procedures and being patient is greatly appreciated.

I also encourage parents to avoid arriving at 3.00pm and 3.15pm as these times appear to be the busiest. Parents who arrive at around 3.08pm and 3.20pm, have very little waiting, if any, because the majority of students have been collected. Staff are on duty in the Kiss and Drive area until 3.30pm each afternoon and so there is no need for parents to rush to be here at 3.00pm (for P to Year 2) or 3.10pm (for Years 3 to 6) when the bell rings for the end of school.
